OPERATING PROCEDURES

Meeting Procedures

The Ocean Protection Council will follow the procedures of the Open Meeting Act. Agendas and meeting notices will be released at least 10 days before each meeting. All briefing materials provided to council members will be posted on the council web site and reference copies will be available to the public for viewing at council meetings. To receive updates on council activities, the public may subscribe to the council's e-mail list server (see details below). All meetings of the council will be open to the public, and all agendas will include time for public comment. When feasible, council meetings will be web cast, and an archive of recordings will be maintained on the web. The council will generally make decisions on a consensus basis. When a vote is necessary, Robert's Rules of Order will be used. Public comment will be included as part of any council action items.

Public Input

The council will seek public input by:

- Receiving public comment at meetings;
- Keeping the public updated with an e-mail list server and web site;
- Encouraging written comments;
